




9:00 AM - DISASTER MEDICAL OPERATIONS

In a disaster, there may be more victims than rescuers, and assistance from medical professionals may not be immediately available. Topics covered: Treatment for life-threatening conditions — airway obstruction, bleeding, and shock — and for other, less urgent conditions; the greatest good for the greatest number of people conducting simple triage and rapid treatment

Gord Smith CEO of **Aviation Interfaith Ministry** leads a society set up for the care and support of the Aviation Community. Gord stepped by faith into Chaplaincy over twenty-eight years ago and recently completed a two year course on leadership. A ministry of Chaplaincy at YYC Gord is developing a Crisis Care Team that will be ready to respond to an air disaster. He is also involved in the Rapid Response Team with the Billy Graham Association, Victim Chaplaincy, and a Certified Chaplain with the International Federation of Christian Chaplains.

"Yourself, your family and then your neighbours!" Your own preparedness in an emergency will make all the difference in you being able to assist your neighbours.



Brent Davis is the Emergency and Disaster Response Manager for **Samaritan's Purse** Canada responsible for both Canadian disasters as well as major international disasters. Over the past 7 years he has coordinated Samaritan's Purse resources for 16 Canadian disasters and 6 international disasters. Most recently in the Southern Alberta flood event which saw Samaritan's Purse engage over 5000 volunteers to assist 800 families in 6 municipalities across Southern Alberta.
