Believers are not only to hear the truth but also to put it into **practice**. Commitment to love and to serve others is evidence of true faith. Keeping God's Command to “Love One Another” shows our faith is vital and real and we are overcoming our own selfishness.

MITIGATION IS MORE THAN INFRASTRUCTURE

This November, 2013 ALBERTA EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCIES Stakeholders Summit was held in Calgary. For the second year, I had the opportunity to attend and appreciated hearing from experts in the field.

Greg Weadick, Associate Minister for Recovery & Reconstruction, SE Alberta, opened the Summit with praise for the emergency agencies efforts during the recent floods but noted we still failed in personal preparedness.

It was also noted, that mitigation is more than infrastructure. It is essential to invest in emergency preparedness, training, planning and equipment. Mitigation should be transparent with community involvement.

Bryan Koon, Director of the Florida Division of Emergency Management stressed the importance of partnerships. In their region they help support NGO's and grass roots endeavours through education, and funding to make sure they are successful and able to assist with the greatest effectiveness when called upon.

Len MacCharles, Deputy Chief CEMA, one of the Key-note speakers, said there was concern for the cost of our new EOC in Calgary. When the floods came, however, the city was ready! “Expect returns on what we invest”

Ron Robinson, Director of Emergency Management, Medicine Hat gave mitigation efforts that are Reasonable, Achievable, and Sustainable?

- ✓ Invite Community Associations
- ✓ Develop Clear Risk reduction framework.
- ✓ Encourage stakeholders to sign up to the Risk Reduction campaign
- ✓ Promote active engagement of community members in using the informational resources
- ✓ Build partnerships in projects with local government, NGO's the private sector, etc. to make your local area safer.

Achievable Mitigation and Risk Reduction

- ✓ Advocate for increased urban risk reduction at the local level.
- ✓ Encourage greater involvement of local stakeholders in regional and international policy development
- ✓ Strengthen the links/relationship between NGO's local governments and community based organizations

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY REPOSE TEAMS (CERT)

The damage caused by natural disasters or from manmade/technological events can affect all aspects of a community. Individual preparedness, planning, survival skills, and mutual aid within neighbourhoods and worksites during this initial period are essential measures in coping with the aftermath of a disaster.

If available, emergency services personnel are the best trained and equipped to handle emergencies. Following a catastrophic disaster, however, you and the community may be on your own for a period of time because of the size of the area affected, lost communications, and impassable roads.

The purpose of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Basic Training is to provide the individuals who complete this course with the basic skills that they will need to respond to their community's immediate needs in the aftermath of a disaster, when emergency services are not immediately available. By working together, CERT members can assist in saving lives and protecting property using the basic techniques in this course. The target audience for CERT is individuals who desire the skills and knowledge required to prepare for and respond to disaster.

Paul distinguishes between freedom to sin and freedom to serve. Freedom to sin is no freedom at all, as it enslaves us to Satan. On the other hand, followers of Christ are free to do what is right to glorify God, through loving service to others.

For the past three months, Bridges of Love has engaged in helping those affected by the flood rebuilding efforts and other tragedies. One family lost their home and belongings due to a devastating fire. It has been a learning experience how best to assist and learning to listen through these difficult times.

Donations have been offered of every description and we recognize the care taken to offer items that are clean, appropriate for the need, and something we would want to receive ourselves. When we were at the beginning stage of matching donations with those in need, we received an email from Erin who had clothing and other items she wished to share.

A return email was sent to Erin, thanking her for posting her donation on our site, sharing we had a family who was in need of her kind contribution. Shauna's family had lost many of their belongings in the flood, as they had just moved into their home weeks before the disaster hit. Boxes in the basement had not yet been unpacked.

Erin had never met this family, so she wanted to make sure she provided items they really needed. After receiving clothing sizes for each of Shauna's six children, she spent a week putting together donations that were extra special with notes of encouragement attached. The extra love and attention shown was evident and greatly appreciated!

This is just one story of the many blessings received from people who knew how to serve one another in love. It has indeed been an out-pouring of sacrificial giving from individuals who expected nothing in return. Their only desire was to help hurting people through a devastating time. They may never meet the individuals and families they helped but God received the glory through their many acts of kindness.

THE STAR THROWER STORY

A story was inspired by the writing of Loren Eiseley. Eiseley combined the better of two cultures. He was a scientist and a poet. From those two perspectives he wrote insightfully and beautifully about the world and our role in it.

There was a wise man, much like Eiseley himself, who used to go to the ocean to do his writing. He enjoyed a ritual, walking on the beach, before he started his work.

One day strolling along the shore, gazing down the beach that stretched for miles, he saw a human figure moving like a dancer. He began to walk faster to catch up. As he got closer, he realized it was a young man and the young man wasn't dancing. He was reaching down to the shore, picking up something and very gently throwing it into the ocean.

Closing the distance between them, he called out, "Good morning! What are you doing?" The young man paused, looked up and replied "Throwing starfish into the ocean."

"I guess I should have asked, why are you throwing starfish into the ocean?"

"The sun is up and the tide is going out. If I don't throw them back; they'll die!"

"Young man, don't you realize there are miles and miles of beach and starfish all along it. You cannot possibly make a difference!"

The young man listened politely. Bending down, he picked up a starfish throwing yet another one into the sea, past the breaking waves.

"It made a difference for that one!"

His response surprised the man. He didn't know how to reply. So instead, he turned away and walked back to the cottage to begin his writing.

All day as he wrote, the image of the young man, crept into his thoughts. He tried to ignore it but the vision persisted. Finally, late in the afternoon he realized that as a scientist, and as a poet, he had missed out on the essential nature of the young man's actions.

He came to the conclusion that the young man was choosing not to be an observer but to make a difference in the lives of those starfish that he saved.

That is our challenge. We must each explore opportunities to find our own starfish.



“A church rooted in the living Lord is a church that encourages people to move beyond their comfort zones and invest themselves in face-to-face, person-to-person, hands-on kinds of ministries.”

Building bridges of love to our community is a two-way structure which requires visionary thinking and a strategic plan. The outcome will bring change and joy for those congregations who are up to the challenge. How do we move from personal agendas to kingdom causes?

“If spiritual maturity is defined in terms of living the life and serving the world, then most evangelical churches are, at best, investing in only the first half of the battle”

Today we need the additional investment of developing a process that equips people to serve better, not just live better. If not, we doom church members to a self-focused immaturity and place the church to the sidelines of the community.

There are very real obstacles making the transition from being served to serving, from finding community ‘in’ the church to impacting the community ‘as’ the church.

Dr. Robert Lewis, “The Church of Irresistible Influence,” found there were four primary roadblocks that one must personally overcome, in order to transition into ‘bridge’ building.

Obstacle #1 – Fear

If the church becomes serious about penetrating the community with God’s love, it will be costly. Change is inevitable so personal sacrifices are necessary.

Obstacle #2 – Confusion

By providing a clearly defined process for people to follow, confusion about the transition to ministry is reduced.

Obstacle #3 – Lack of Direction

When it comes to serving the kingdom, “What are the options?” People want to serve with purpose, meaning and fulfillment.

Obstacle #4 – Questions of Impact

This final obstacle is rooted in faith. As we look across a terrifying—and ever—widening—chasm, are we prepared to bridge the gap? Is the span that exists between the church and the community simply too vast and too intimidating?

Albertans told to prepare for more severe weather storms

After dubbing Wild Rose Country the new natural disaster capital of Canada, the Insurance Bureau of Canada is urging government, business leaders and citizens to ramp up efforts to mitigate losses from storms and floods.

The CEO of the IBC, Don Forgeron, shares with the Chamber of Commerce luncheon; his message is simple; everyone needs to adapt to the changing climate.

Scientists predict because of rising global temperatures we are going to see a 10 per cent increase in severe weather between now and 2050.

660 News Meteorologist David Spence says every year some of the most intense hail storms in the country occur between Calgary and Red Deer and east towards Drumheller.

Over the past few years, Alberta has dealt with everything from hail storms and floods to wildfires. The IBC reports over the past four years insurers have paid out roughly \$670 million annually to Albertans, up from an average of \$100 million annually from the previous 15 year period.

FREE ON-LINE COURSES

Basic Emergency Management (BEM)

This course provides an overview of emergency management in Alberta including the systems and processes for preventing, mitigating, preparing for, responding to and recovering from emergencies and disaster. You will learn about the key provisions of the Emergency Management Act and have the opportunity to identify the roles and responsibilities of various levels of government and other key organizations involved in emergency management.

Exercise Design 100

This introductory self-study program will provide you with the basic concepts of exercise program management, including key terms and an overview of the exercise design process. Upon successful completion, you will be able to actively participate as a member of an exercise design team or program committee member.

ICS 100

The Incident Command System is a standardized management system used to organize and manage a scaleable response to emergency incidents of any magnitude. ICS 100 (Module 1) is intended as an introduction and overview of the ICS. It is intended for people who may be assigned to incidents in non-supervisory roles and as a prerequisite for students continuing on through other levels.

The Emergency Social Services Basic course was created by the Public Health Agency of Canada’s (PHAC), Centre for Emergency Preparedness and Response (CEPR) in collaboration with the council of Emergency Social Services Directors.

7. Churches provide comfort and spiritual solace. *(Trained volunteers can serve and respond in many areas)*
8. Churches can network with community disaster response efforts. *(BofL has built relationships with Municipal, Provincial and Federal Emergency Agencies forming the FEPI Advisory Council)*
9. Churches teach their people to share their faith. *(FEPI churches are ready to give an answer if asked why they are assisting during a disaster situation)*
10. Churches can take an active role in cooperating with local disaster response organizations. *(BofL secured a Service Agree with the Calgary Emergency Management Agency in May, 2011)*
11. A church can cooperate with churches and compassionate ministries. Networks of churches working together in compassionate ministries before disaster strikes will be much more effective through their combined efforts in the wake of a disaster or crisis. *(FEPI)*

LOVE IS ACTION – March, 2013

“MY COMMAND IS THIS: LOVE EACH OTHER AS I HAVE LOVED YOU.” John 15:12

“A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.” John 13:34-35

Of the two instances when Jesus used the word “command” the first was in His final message when He gave the New Command to the disciples at the Last Supper (John 13:34).

The second instance was when He gave His final charge—the Great Commission—to His disciples just before His ascension (Matthew 28:19-20).

Gaylord Enns poses the question...“Have we missed the significance of the New Commandment Jesus gave each of His followers?” Due to his extensive Biblical study writing “Love Revolution,” it revealed a stunning omission in his own thinking. Gaylord attended church all his life, yet in his training, in years of personal study and in decades of teaching others, he could not remember being taught or teaching others this basic truth. **“Love one another”** was Jesus’ Command—the One Command He owned as “His.” He concludes, how could he possibly have missed something so clear, so obvious and so simple?”

Early Christians had a treasure—the Command given them by Jesus. They loved each other deeply. This love was clearly seen in the scriptural record of those early years.

“All the believers were together and had everything in common. Selling their possessions and goods, they gave to anyone as he had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their numbers daily those who were saved.” (Acts 2:44-47)

As time passed, however, their love for one another was tested and over the decades that followed, their attention drifted from the Command Jesus had given them.

Thus, a core commandment of Christian discipleship faded from the vision of the early church fathers. Enns shared, the unfortunate irony was that the goal of orthodoxy was to keep Christianity authentic. Yet the very mark of authenticity that Jesus had given them was lost, even as they pursued this noble goal.

He now returned with his girl-friend so perhaps she could connect with other Christians and experience a similar transformation.

On two occasions this couple passed our booth and each time she exclaimed her delight for the colourful toques. She did not stop to talk but commented quietly as they hurried by. I felt God’s tug to go after her as she made her way down the aisle.

Tapping gently on her shoulder, I asked if she would like a little toque containing a jar of honey labeled, “God’s Sweet Love.”

Her eyes spoke such sadness but a little smile came to her lips and she said, “Really, for me?” Tears began to fill her eyes. She hugged me so tightly that she dropped the little bag, with the honey jar shattering, as it hit the floor.

As I hurried back to our booth to retrieve another bag, this experience was a strong reminder that we can not overestimate the value or overemphasize the significance, of the core commandment of authentic Christian faith and practice.

Enhancing Community Resilience by Informing and Empowering Youth

Community resiliency is augmented when children and youth are educated in preparedness and response (Twigg 2004). Children and youth are also less burdened by social inhibitions and outright discrimination, and are quick to form bonds with their peers, regardless of class, race or religion, [thus] they have the ability through this characterization, to increase awareness of risks and hazards within a culture of “it won’t happen here” or “doesn’t affect me (UNICEF 2005).”

Studies published by UNICEF (2004) clearly document the ability of children and youth to actively participate in urban and environmental planning, contributing enthusiasm, creative ideas, and a willingness to cooperate.

When children learn about hazards’ type and frequency, and how to protect themselves, they also learn that they do have the power to help themselves, no matter what adults around them may think (Finnis et al, 2004). Knowledge of protective behaviour will decrease children’s vulnerability when alone or unsupervised, and will decrease their family’s vulnerability, because the children could act independently. Community resilience can be enhanced when we inform, empower and enable youth.

I read this article many months ago but it did not strike a cord until I spent an evening with the Emmanuel Community Church youth group and witnessed first hand their enthusiasm and interest in emergency preparedness and handing out emergency resources to their community. They were indeed a ‘breath of fresh air’ and great kids with servant hearts.

A few comments from the youth who made connections with their neighbours...

“They were really nice people who listened to what we were saying...”

“There was the odd person who was not as interested since it was church related but most appreciated that help was coming from a church in their community.”

“Some people were skeptical when they heard we were from the church but after we shared that we wanted to help during a disaster they were grateful. I think it is important to let them know we are from a church!”

“A few asked if they had to pay for the materials but when they heard it was free, they were happy.”

How can we be better informed to prepare our home and family in the event of a disaster? How do we make a disaster preparedness plan? What supplies should we include in a 72 hr. kit? Who do we call when systems are over-whelmed and we are not able to access public emergency agencies?

These questions and many others are answered in Alberta Health Services [“Personal and Family Disaster Preparedness Guide”](#) which was distributed to a West Dover community along with a post card sized Faith Emergency Preparedness Initiative (FEPI) fridge [magnet](#) with Calgary’s Emergency Agency’s phone numbers as well as Bridges of Love’s FEPI Coordination Centre’s contact information.

Twelve enthusiastic youth, grades 7 to 12 from Emmanuel Community Church youth group lead by Wendy Coughlan, braved the cold and dawned their “Love Bee...ing Prepared” toques to personally deliver valuable emergency information to their community. Neighbours were very pleased to learn a local church partnered with Bridges of Love Ministry Faith Emergency Preparedness Initiative to be coordinated and ready to assist; should a disaster occur.

- When was the last time we were emotionally, even viscerally, disturbed when we heard about injustice, suffering, or God’s people operating in a way that was contrary to the clear, written will of God?

“Over the past decade, there has been increasing interest among public officials to engage the faith-based sector. This increase in both desire and mandate to work with faith-communities has not been adequately supported with the requisite knowledge, cultural competencies, and religious literacy to deal with the complexities of the many different faith-communities and the resulting myriad of organizational expressions in the United States. In fact, many government efforts see congregations solely as locations from which to execute government initiatives, source individual volunteers, or perhaps provide shelter during an emergency. Congregations are not understood as a system with unique institutional attributes, substantial underutilized assets, and organizational partners that can be more fully harnessed in times of crisis.

Similarly, congregations across the religious and political spectrum are simultaneously interested in, and cautious about, engagement with public officials. While they work to meet the needs of their congregants and their surrounding communities, and in some cases may have a more global perspective, many remain wary of partnerships with public agencies because of legitimate concerns about government intrusion into the lives of their congregations, or historic experiences of partnerships gone awry.

*However, if the sustainable involvement of congregations can be **systematized**, there is great potential to increase their engagement and effectiveness in disaster preparedness and response. Understanding the capacity and capabilities of congregations and envisioning what they might be able to do with more training and sustained support represents an important step. Addressing mutual concerns and closing the knowledge gap that exists between faith communities and government will also enhance partnerships. Addressing this critical link in the emergency management and public health emergency chain will enable congregations, FBOs, and government efforts to more effectively and efficiently work together during times of crisis.”*
