

"THIS IS THE DAY WHICH THE LORD HAS MADE: WE WILL REJOICE AND BE GLAD IN IT" Psalm 118:24



The theme for June's Newsletter was chosen from a verse from Psalms. scripture was a good fit with a photo Tom took in the early morning as we walked our dog, Buddy, behind our condo where we enjoy a forested area. After fresh rain from the previous day, not only did we appreciate the beauty of nature's new life, but we also took in the sweet aroma that filled the air.

Psalm 118:24 declares joy and gratitude for God's creation and provision. It encourages people to find joy in the present day and celebrate each day as a gift from God.

- 1. Joy and celebration: It calls for rejoicing and expressing gladness in the current day.
- 2. God's role: It acknowledges that the Lord has made this day and that we should find joy in that fact.
- Meaning of "day": Some interpret "day" not just as 24 hours, but as a period or season of life, suggesting we should find joy in each stage of life.
- 4. Example of a prayer: Psalm 118:24 can be used as a starting point for a prayer of gratitude, acknowledging God's provision and asking for joy in the current moment.

"FIRESMART ALBERTA"

Living in the lovely city of Red Deer for the past year has made us take note of the upkeep necessary for the many treed areas in this region. We appreciate the beautiful parks and tree-lined streets. It is truly a haven for nature lovers with beauty throughout the city. We cannot completely enjoy these treed areas, however, without a level of concern for the threat of wildfire!

The challenges that come from heavily treed areas call for a made-in-province solution for wildfire risk reduction and prevention—one that includes resources, tools, and programs that are everyone. FireSmart accessible to Alberta, founded in 2020, grew out of the top recommendation of the Government of Alberta's Spring 2019 Wildfire Review Final Report. Their goal is to foster an allof-society approach to wildfire resiliency in Alberta. FireSmart Alberta works collaboratively and in alignment with FireSmart Canada.

Just as we all have a responsibility to be prepared for a disaster, we also have a responsibility to do what we can to prevent fire from destroying homes and landscapes in areas where we live. Wildfires are a natural part of Alberta's wildland ecosystems, so without wildfires, the landscape loses its diversity. Wildfires recycle nutrients, help plants reproduce and create a mosaic of vegetation that provides habitat for a variety of wildlife.

By choosing to extend our lifestyles and communities further into forested areas, however, we become more exposed to the danger of wildfires, putting our homes at risk.
